

Sector Allocation




Risk

Market Review

Malaysian Government Securities ended mixed in Oct 2020 with strong buying flows seen mainly on the short end of the curve as the market priced in a potential rate cut following the implementation of the targeted Conditional Movement Control Order in certain states. Meanwhile, some selling pressure were seen on the long end of the curve due to political headwinds on a rumoured declaration of a state of emergency to combat Covid-19. MYR strengthened by 0.02% against the greenback to close the month at MYR4.1558.

The FBM100 fell by 2.1% MoM on 30 October 2020. The local Index underperformed the MSCI Asia Ex Japan Index, which rose by 2.7% MoM in MYR terms over the same period. Foreigners were net sellers of the local market with a net outflow of USD161m in October 2020, lowest in the past nine months, bringing total foreign outflow to USD5.4bn YTD. Over the month of October, the global equities were dragged by resurgence of COVID-19 cases as the infection numbers continue to tell two contrasting stories. Infection numbers started to accelerate again in Europe and the US in September and October. Meanwhile in Asia, low and steady infection numbers have instead prompted discussions of travel bubbles to revive the ailing travel and hospitality industries.

Market Outlook

While Covid-19 pandemic continues to linger until a credible vaccine is found, global central banks will remain largely accommodative in the monetary policy space while fiscal policy will remain expansionary in support of growth. With an expansionary budget to boost growth and support economic recovery, a wider fiscal deficit coupled with a larger supply of government bonds will continue to weigh on the yield curve. Market volatility is expected to remain in the short term and continue to weigh on the rates market in view of the US Presidential Election, potentially more fiscal stimulus packages to be announced and Budget 2021. Nevertheless, the local bond market shall continue to be supported with ample onshore liquidity.

We remain cautiously optimistic on selected sectors with high degree of earnings visibility or sectors that are expected to benefit from a rapid recovery in tandem with the gradual reopening of the economy. Unprecedented fiscal and monetary stimulus rolled out across the world have provided some support to the general health of the economy, although we are cognizant that the swift rebound in financial markets may have also priced in a rapid pace of recovery that is far from guaranteed.
