Investment Strategy

The Fund will invest in a Shariah-compliant portfolio comprising equities with potential for growth and equities that are trading below their fair value. The Fund will also invest at least 40% of its NAV in Sukuk and Islamic money market instruments with a minimum credit rating of "BBB3" or "P2" by RAM or equivalent rating by MARC.

The Fund will only invest locally.



Sector Allocation



Market Review

Government Investment Issue ("GII") yield curve bear-flattened in Oct 2021. Domestic bond market sentiment remained cautious as it was a heavy auction month, couple with rising US Treasury ("UST") yields and the national Budget 2022 announcement at end-Oct 2021. On the currency front, MYR strengthened by 1.1% against the greenback to close the month at MYR4.1403. On the economic data front, Malaysia's foreign reserves increased to USD115.6 billion as of 15 Oct 2021 (30 Sep 2021: USD115.2 billion). The reserves are sufficient to sustain 8.2 months of retained imports and 1.3x of short-term external debt.

The FBMS ("Index") rose by 1.9% Month-on-Month ("MoM") and outperformed the MSCI Asia Ex Japan Index, which rose by 0.2% MoM in Malaysian ringgit ("MYR") on 29 October 2021. During the month, foreign investors were net buyers of RM1.6bn of Malaysian equities. Notable news flows during the month include Budget 2022 which projects a limited fiscal consolidation - fiscal deficit of 6% of GDP (2021: 6.5%) and a GDP growth of 5.5-6.5% in 2022 (2021/22: 6.7%/6.0% previously) and the imposition of the one-off 33% income tax rate for profits exceeding RM100m in 2022 has dampened FY22F earnings growth outlook for stocks in Malaysia.

Market Outlook

Given the economic recovery is partially reflected in the equity market, investors are currently watching the macro data closely to gauge the strength of inflationary pressure and the timing of a QE tapering. Investors will continue monitoring Covid-19 situation following the recent resurgence in positive cases and the emergence of new variants.

We expect Bank Negara Malaysia's policy measures to remain accommodative in the near term. Higher supply of sovereign bonds should be well absorbed by the market, as the additional supply to be concentrated at the short to belly of the curve. Overall, the domestic financial system liquidity remains flushed, which shall remain supportive of the bond market.
